


Who We Are




OUR DIFFERENCE



At **UA Brokers Without Borders** our focus is the creation of **end-to-end humanitarian projects**. What this means is that we develop a comprehensive approach to modern humanitarian aid that rests on 4 key pillars:



Given that we tackle aid as end-to-end project, we are able to provide the much needed **transparency** to all parties involved.







EMERGENCY REPAIRS

It is now beyond the doubt that the war will be prolonged, necessitating Ukrainians to adjust their lives to new circumstances.

Resilience in this reality requires preservation of vital infrastructure.

Consequently, our focus is on repairing lightly and moderately damaged critical social infrastructure, such as schools, kindergartens, and hospitals, particularly in the most vulnerable communities affected by shelling.



ACCESS TO MEDICATIONS

The war in Ukraine led to impoverishment of state and the population.

Through the course of 2023 we supported vulnerable groups of population by providing essential medications.

Our program provided assistance to families with prematurely born children; elderly people with cardiac problems, and patients with severe burn trauma. These groups could receive essential medications in the hospitals at no cost.



WINTER IN HOSPITALS

The winter of 2022/2023 posed a significant challenge to the healthcare sector in Ukraine. Hospitals faced a range of issues, such as electricity and heating disruptions, water supply shortages, constant attacks on medical infrastructure, patient migration and other.

Our team proactively prepared for the winter with the goal of providing hospitals with alternative sources of power, efficient heating equipment, and assisting hospitals with insulation works.



MEDICAL EQUIPMENT

The war has led to an increased need for surgical interventions due to constant bombings, exacerbating the shortage of essential medical equipment in hospitals.

Our organization has been committed to improving the infrastructure of medical facilities.

In 2023, our goal was to enhance healthcare capabilities by providing mobile diagnostic equipment and upgrading hospitals' sterilization facilities.

PROGRAM 1: EMERGENCY REPAIRS OF SOCIAL INFRASTRUCTURE









The UA Brokers Without Borders team has decided to focus this project on repairs of light and medium complexity, aimed at restoring infrastructure damaged by shelling (schools, kindergartens, hospitals).



WHYTHIS IS CRUCIAL:

- Ensuring the quality of life for community residents to preserve human potential locally and prevent permanent migration abroad;
- Supporting local communities in terms of the restoration and socio-economic development:
- Restoring access to critical community services like education and medical care:
- Balancing the lack of state funding during the active phase of hostilities.

The Kyiv Regional Center for Mental Health endured air strikes, rocket shelling, and occupation. The facility suffered acts of vandalism, an explosive wave shattered all the windows, and the facility's premises were mined.

Following the liberation of Vorzel and demining operations, the center resumed outpatient care, and on May 16 2022, it admitted its first patients for inpatient treatment. Our organization contributed to the replacement of windows at the center, with a total of 53 windows being replaced.

PROGRAM 2: MEDICATIONS FOR MATERNITY HOSPITALS









The war has presented a substantial challenge for pregnant women. In the early months of the conflict, women often had to give birth in basements and bomb shelters, without access to proper medical care, in facilities targeted by shelling, and during disruptions to power, water, and heating due to heavy artillery and missile attacks. Persistent stress and limited access to medical assistance, particularly in frontline areas, continued to increase the risk of premature births.

Our goal was to assist families with prematurely born children by providing them with medications to prevent complications that are common among premature babies -breathing failure, heart issues and internal bleeding.



These important and expensive medications were distributed nationally and families could receive them at no cost.

Story of impact: Lviv Perinatal Center

Tiny Artur was born prematurely, at 23 weeks of pregnancy, weighing 580 g. The boy spent the first month of his life in the department of anesthesiology and neonatal intensive care, where he received highly specialized treatment and vital medications. Thanks to the joint actions of the Americares Foundation, UA Brokers Without Borders and CF "Wings of Hope", the hospital is supplied with all these medications. In 2022, more than 400 babies like Artur, prematurely born at different gestational ages, were treated in the Lviv perinatal center.

PROGRAM 2: MEDICATIONS FOR BURN TRAUMA AND CARDIAC PATIENTS











Rapid impoverishment of Ukrainian population meant that even essential medications became out of reach to the patients in need.

Since February 24, 2022, the number of patients with severe burn injuries caused by shelling and mine explosions has soared across the country.

We decided to provide assistance to these patients by supplying the hospitals treating them with following supplies:

- → Modern burn dressings which decrease infection risk, and make healing process a lot faster and less painful;
- → Albumin blood component, that patients with severe injuries lose together with blood. Albumin is a highly expensive albeit vital medication.

Heart disease and high blood pressure are prevalent among Ukraine's elderly population, rendering them vulnerable during times of war due to their reliance on continuous medication use. To address this, we provided special assistance to individuals with chronic cardiac illnesses, ensuring they receive an extended supply of medications at no cost.

The use of albumin solutions has been widespread among clinicians worldwide for over half a century. It is indicated for various conditions associated with hypovolemia and hypoalbuminemia. This includes patients with critical and supercritical burns of all age groups, as well as those affected by the consequences of military actions with severe combined injuries.

PROGRAM 3: WINTER IN HOSPITALS









The winter of 2022/2023 was the most challenging one in modern Ukrainian history. Shelling of critical infrastructure, widespread power outages, water and gas shortages throughout the country disrupted the healthcare sector and made it impossible to provide proper assistance to patients.

We began receiving requests for help from medical institutions in preparation for the winter season. Hospitals complained about the lack of functioning backup generators, loss and damage to equipment during looting, the absence of central water supply and heating, problems with bomb shelter infrastructure, and broken windows.

KEY GOALS OF THE PROJECT:



equip hospitals with alternative power sources (generators, charging stations, UPS)

provide hospitals with heaters and boilers

reduce electricity consumption in hospital buildings

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Story of impact: Vovchansk central district hospital

Located within 10 km to the border with Russia, the city has gone through occupation, de-occupation and continuous shelling. As a result of shelling, the hospital's infrastructure was compromised, leaving the medical staff without access to vital resources such as electricity, gas, and hot water. Delivering generator and other equipment to the hospital was a challenging endeavor. The mission was a success and helped ensure the continued provision of essential medical services in this conflict-affected region.

PROGRAM 4: MEDICAL EQUIPMENT FOR UKRAINIAN HOSPITALS









In 2023, the escalating number of surgical interventions, a consequence of persistent bombing, underscored the urgent need for additional tools and equipment to ensure the provision of adequate medical aid.

That is why we decided to focus on the supply of modern equipment for the diagnosis of injuries (i.e. ultrasound and mobile x-ray devices), as well as on strengthening the facilities' sterilization facilities (via sterilization equipment provision).




We focused on the hospitals in the frontline regions facing constant inflow of the patients with war caused injuries and facilities that have mobile medical teams.





FOCUS OF ACTIVITY 2024



Emergency Repairs of Social Infrastructure

Problem: Due to forced displacement, the destruction of kindergartens, power outages, air raids, and military activity, a portion of the Ukrainian children lacks access to safe preschool education. The repercussions extend beyond the developmental impact on children; parents find themselves unable to pursue employment opportunities.

Response: This program is aimed at light and medium repairs of educational facilities in the war-affected regions in the South, East, and North of Ukraine, mainly the kindergartens.

Wartime Spread of Antimicrobial Resistance

Problem: The war provokes the spread of bacterial infections and makes it harder to take the usual precautions against antibiotic resistance. War also leads to surge of patients in critical state that are at high risk of bacterial infections.

Response: This program addresses the antimicrobial resistance in Ukraine on two levels: (a) by supplying modern antibiotics and antibiotic susceptibility tests to hospitals and by (b) strengthening the laboratories within the hospitals, that are facing constant inflow of the patients with war caused injuries.



Humanitarian Demining

Problem: Ukraine has become the most mined country in the world, with around 174K km² of its territory potentially polluted with explosive ordinance (almost 30% of the total area of the country). Reconstruction of Ukraine is not feasible without large scale humanitarian demining work.

Response:

- 1. Equip State Emergency Teams;
- 2. Co-fund demining efforts in communities;
- 3. Invest in Ukrainian demining technology startups.



Strengthening Infrastructure of Medical Facilities

Problem: Many hospitals in Ukraine are experiencing an acute shortage of essential medical equipment necessary for primary diagnostics, surgical interventions, and sterilization.

Response:

Assisting medical institutions in meeting their needs for crucial medical equipment has a substantial impact on enhancing the quality and systematic delivery of medical care to the wounded. Our current focus includes provision of various configurations of X-ray machines, portable ultrasound devices, and sterilization equipment.
